²The cost of airfare will vary depending on many factors, such as point of departure from the U.S., carrier, and date of purchase.

³This price assumes use of a private sector, third-party service. The cost may vary by provider. It is also possible to get a visa in person, assuming there is a Chinese Consulate near you. IU McKinney School of Law receives a discount from one third-party service provider. All CLSP participants, regardless of home law school are eligible for this discount if you obtain your visa through the CLSP Coordinator. Participants are not required to use any particular third party service provider and are encouraged to shop for the provider that best meets their needs.

⁴Students can exercise significant control over this estimate; local foods generally cost less than western foods; actual expense may be higher or lower depending on student choices.

⁵Students can exercise significant control over this estimate; miscellaneous expenses could include laundry, subway and taxi fares, admission to cultural events (outside the program); many students also buy a Chinese cell phone or Chinese sim card.

⁶The Chinese Law Summer Program does not charge tuition. Whether your home law school charges tuition or a credit transfer fee (or similar fee) is a matter between you and your law school. Students at IU McKinney School of Law should consult with Professor Wilson; students at Boston College Law School, University of Oklahoma College of Law, University of Tennessee Law School, University of Bergen Faculty of Law, and Autonomous University of Barcelona Faculty of Law should consult with the CLSP director at your law school. Students at other law or graduate schools should determine your school's policies.
